Guests were welcomed into the Bailey Hall by Head Teacher, Barry Graham, who said he considers it a privilege to have been involved in the planning and the move into the new building and creating a new academy of distinction. Mr Graham introduced Head Boy Hagen Patterson who proceeded to declare the new school open. The assembled audience were then treated to the voice of Head Girl Kaye Dalgliesh who gave a beautiful rendition of the Eva Cassidy classic





"Songbird" followed by a haunting version of the ever popular "Highland Cathedral". Kaye was followed by Depute Head Girl Kirsty Bryson who performed beautifully two songs from the shows, "Memory" from the musical "Cats" and "I'm Not That Girl" from the new musical "Wicked". To conclude the performance part of the proceedings, Mr Graham invited a group of musicians who were all friends of the late Kevin Bailey onto the stage to perform a set of tunes in his honour. Kevin was a much loved and highly respected Physics teacher at Wallace Hall Academy for 26 years until he sadly passed away in August 2007. He also was heavily involved in the traditional music scene and encouraged and supported many of the school's budding traditional musicians through the school

ceilidh band "Celtic Caboodle". To acknowledge Kevin's contribution to the school the Assembly Hall in the new building has been named the Bailey Hall in his memory. Throughout the afternoon visitors were able to have guided tours round the school and see the new, state-of-the-art equipment and facilities available. Presentations on Recognising Achievement, Curriculum for Excellence, Queensberry Initiative and Glow were offered as an option by the school's senior management team. Refreshments were available and a silent auction took place with a number of excellent auction items donated by local businesses. Local artist Kathleen Woods gifted a stunning original oil painting titled "Towards Kirkcudbright" and this was the prize for the winner of the hotly contested num-



bers board. Head Teacher Barry Graham said "This open day has been organised very much with the community in mind as we are keen to build relationships and work together with local people. On Wednesday 5th of March all S1 pupils were treated to a fantastic day of Science which was thoroughly enjoyed. On a rotational basis, all the pupils had the opportunity to take part in two activities, "My Great Adventure" and "The Colour Show" organised as part of the "Wild Science Festival". "My Great Adventure" was a hands on insight into the migration of barnacle geese from the Arctic Svalbard to the Solway and their return journey. The experience was put on by Caerlaverock Wildlife and Wetlands Trust and the fun activities included pupils taking on the role of geese and being caught and ringed. This was described by the pupils as a highlight saying: "It was really fun! Especially the running around!"

Pupils also got the opportunity to try some of the more technical aspects of the Trust i.e. taking biometrics and fitting GPS satellite tags.

The second activity, "The Colour Show" was described as a demonstration of colour phenomena where pupils got the chance to see how our vision of colour really works. One pupil described this as "amazing, but really weird!" This activity was part of the Glasgow University Science Festival which is currently taking place across the country. The pupils got to see where the colours come from through a range of great demonstrations.



The Queensberry Initiative

The Queensberry Initiative: Supporting the Education of All our Students

The Queensberry Initiative Strategic Group was formed in September 2008 to address concerns about getting children and young people out of the classroom to build their connection to their community and to economic life in Dumfries and Galloway, while improving their health and well-being. The Group is also concerned about the need to develop skills for work and an enterprising, entrepreneurial approach in children and young people. This year Wallace Hall Academy has Rural Skills and Construction Skills courses running along with other courses undertaken with the support of Queensberry Estate, Dumfries and Galloway College and Barony College. Other areas in this Initiative include updating work experience, improving transition support for identified pupils in P7, S2 and S4, building enterprise activities more fully into the core curriculum and expanding our links with the local community. We particularly value the partnership working which is at the heart of our Strategic Group and our relationships within the cluster and with the community and other business associates.

With some funding support, the Initiative appointed two part time members of staff to help expand this project. These staff help to ensure that all pupils are getting the chance to participate, including all the pupils in the area primary schools, and they manage the essential links between the school and the community, particularly Queensberry Estate and all the outdoor possibilities that its generous 'open door' invitation to schools in Mid-Nithsdale has presented to us.

We have been successful in involving a large number of placement providers in our community to help to expand our work-related learning initiatives. We are working with local businesses to make placements more meaningful for both businesses and pupils, involving them in the process before pupils are matched and ensuring that appropriate feedback is gathered at the end of placements. We have also begun a business mentor programme this year for certain pupils in our P7 transition cohort, some S2s and S4 potential leavers. This initiative is designed to give pupils an opportunity to make relationships with role models from the 'real world' and to help them to make more informed career choices. On 18 June we are organising a Rural Opportunities Day, to let our primary pupils and all the pupils here at Wallace Hall see the wealth of careers, jobs and enterprises which take place in their home area. It looks like a very varied day, with stands being manned by artists, artisans, musicians, plumbers, colleges, dog handlers and chefs, among many others. We hope to make this a biannual event.

We are now looking for ways to sustain our project. We are particularly interested in piloting new approaches to enriching the life experiences of the young people who live in this rural area and in sharing what we are learning through a rigorous programme of evaluation with other groups, schools and relevant bodies. We have attracted attention from Mike Russell, the Cabinet Secretary for Education, who paid a visit to the Initiative at the end of March this year. We are also having a visit shortly from outdoor education and enterprise advisers in this area from Learning Teaching Scotland (LTS). We believe that what we are working on here is both ground-breaking and important to the children and young people in this area.
