ITEM		Action
1.	Welcome. Louise Cochran, acting chair, welcomed everyone to the meeting.	
2.	Approval of minutes of meeting on 11th March 2019. The minutes were approved without amendment: approved John Blair, seconded Kerry Fry.	
3.	Correspondence, charity sponsorship. On Saturday 28 th September two Wallacehall pupils, Phoebe Murray and Aaron Martin, are organizing a Charity Ball in aid of Mental Health and raising awareness of mental health issues and effects and have asked for PC support. It was agreed that the PC would sponsor a table at a cost of £50 & help publicise the event at a later date (beginning of autumn term) to boost ticket sales if required. Individual members can donate prizes or purchase tickets (£35) if they wish. Table sponsorship includes publicising your organization at the event.	
4.	Euan Mack presentation on mental health in the school. Plans are in place in the school to develop a strategic approach to mental health. EM updated PC on mental health work in the school. This year there has been a change from PSE classes to Health and Wellbeing classes in the Academy and now instead of all teachers having a PSE class, a smaller group of staff have volunteered to undergo additional training to take the Health and Wellbeing classes. A lot of pupil feedback has been sought. A review of mental health and the school’s policy and activities related to mental health is ongoing and includes canvassing pupil and staff opinion. There have also been a number of outside speakers invited to speak to senior pupils. Stress control is the program being used in the senior phase. It was done with S4, 5 and 6 this year, but in future will be done at the beginning of S4. It’s based on a program developed for schools by Dr Jim White, Consultant Psychiatrist, and is aimed at early intervention and encouraging pupils to manage their own mental health. Key aspects: talk a lot about how we know when we’re stressed and anxious and what effects this has on mind/body. Encouraging and emphasising importance of a good night’s sleep – putting the phone down. Key message: normalising – recognising that we all get stressed and the important thing is to get in place strategies for coping, particularly in establishing good wellbeing as a basis of exam success.	

	<p>Evaluation: evaluation is based on a questionnaire given out to pupils with comparison of results. There have been improvements. Qualitative feedback has also been undertaken and will result in some changes to the program. Staff feedback was also gathered. The school have Gail Finlay, youth information worker, now based here on Tuesday. GF can provide one to one support, beyond what the Health and Wellbeing, pupil support teachers can provide. After that a pupil could be referred to the school nurse or referred to CAMHS (Child and Adult Mental Health Service) – and they are usually seen within 2 weeks. EM has weekly meeting with mental health worker from CAMHS. Next step is to update some of our resources and continue to use the strategies that have been put in place. Over time mental health focus will include younger pupils, S1-3 and upper primary. The Scottish government has an action plan for every school to have a full time school counsellor. There was a parents’ event on managing stress which was reasonably well attended and will be offered at the Senior Parents evening.</p> <p><i>Any questions or suggestions?</i></p> <p>The stress talk was very helpful/informative.</p> <p>Q. What is the time frame for filtering down the school? A. By the end of the year into BGE.</p> <p>The primary is also running a program to ask children to think about their emotions and to start to regulate their emotions throughout the primary. Some S5 and 6 pupils are going into primary and delivering parts of the program, as primary pupils respond well to the older children.</p> <p>There has been comparison of the health and wellbeing with one other school, comparing results to questionnaires.</p> <p>Q. Is there anyone gathering the information and comparing among schools in the authority. A. Not as yet, as WHA is a pilot program for the authority.</p>

	<p>whom we've been dealing with for the past 5 years. Review of letters. Letter from 28th March 2019. Clarification of ownership. All 3 pitches managed and maintained by PPP contractor, E4D&G Project Co Ltd. One was constructed by E4D&G and has a fully functioning draining system and two were inherited with the requirement to maintain, e.g. grass cutting, but not to install any drainage. PC was advised by Paul McCulloch that the only solution is to fully excavate and install a fully functional drainage system at a cost of £300K and there is no available budget. Last survey of pitches was in August. LC recommended that we take up Paul McCulloch's offer to come and meet which will give them the opportunity to inform him fully of the situation. CO suggested inviting press at the same time. Question of what the details of the contract for maintenance with E4D&G. It has been difficult to get a hold of the contract. Even Oliver Mundell, MSP, has asked for details of the contract with E4D&G without success. CO said that although you might not be able to see the contract, you can ask for specific information within the contract. Question – who owns the land. Suggestion it might be Buccleuch estates. <p>9.</p>	<p>School Crossing Email received from Mark to say that there are no budget changes proposed that will impact on school crossing patrols. Letter re school crossing was received from Michael James, Community Assets Manager.</p>	
<p>10.</p>	<p>Road Safety Jillian Maxwell contacted LC about a bus (no. 236) driving too close to the pavement and slightly fast, near the War Memorial/Brownriggs. Two parents had come into the school to report the incident. They have been watching this for weeks and months and it is road safety issue. One wobble from the pavement or pupil inadvertently stepping off the pavement could result in an accident. Caroline O'Hara said that the Council has in the past, on request of Mr Dillon, cut back bushes to preserve maximum width of the pavement. LC said Parent Council can request Community Police Officer to observe. Euan Mack will report to Lyndsey Heron (school transport). JM mentioned signage, especially re speed (20mph) not obvious.
