IDL science and business




S1 pupils were treated to an IDL afternoon between the Science and Business Management departments during May.

Iceland Trip

When someone mentions Iceland, many people may think about the High Street supermarket. But for forty S3-S5 pupils, their thoughts couldn't have been further from food shopping

as the Geography trip to the country of Iceland approached.

The excited students congregated at Wallace Hall Academy on June 3rd, ready to start their journey to Iceland. After a short bus ride to Glasgow Airport and then a two-hour plane journey, we arrived in Iceland. We met our guide, Rob, and

travelled to our first stop of the journey: the Blue Lagoon, a man-made geothermal spa which gets its name from the water, which is rich in chemicals such

as sulphur and silica, both of which can help heal many skin conditions. We all made use of the white clay masks which were on offer, and marvelled at how nice they made our skin feel. After this very relaxing stop, we had a drive which was about an hour long



before arriving at our lovely hotel which was in a town called Hveragerði, 30 minutes south-east of Reykjavík.

Our second day was a tour of the Golden Circle and it opened with a stop at Faxifoss Waterfall, which

we were all verv impressed with. However, when we arrived at our second stop, Gullfoss Waterfall, we were all speechless at the fact that enough water to fill an Olympic swimming pool cascaded down the waterfall every second. The waterfall is approached along the rim of a 2.5km canyon which was

very impressive. Our lunch stop was at the Great Geysir. This is the most active geyser in the area and it spouts up to 25m high every five minutes. We all concluded after this spot that every area where there



is geothermal activity smells strongly of rotten egg due to the sulphur present. After lunch, we journeyed to Þingvellir National Park, which is where the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates meet to form the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, with an area of "no-man's



land" in between. The two plates come together to make a beautiful canyon and we all enjoyed learning about the history of the area. When the Vikings



arrived in Iceland, they used an area in the national park as their government, before moving the government to the capital city of Reykjavik. Following on from this stop, we travelled to Hellisheidi power station, where we had a tour and learned about



geothermal power. Here we learned that it only takes two people to control the whole power station. Our day ended back at the hotel, where many enjoyed the available facilities, including the games room and the outdoor pool and waterslide.

We spent the third day on the South Shores of



Iceland, and our first stop was near to Eyjafjallajökull, the volcano that disrupted all air travel across Europe when in erupted in 2010. Following this, we then travelled to Skógafoss Waterfall, climbing up 429 steps to be parallel to the top of the waterfall. When



we got back to the bottom, those who were in full waterproofs were allowed the opportunity to walk to the plunge pool of the waterfall, getting extremely wet in the process. After our lunch stop, we travelled along the tombolo to the black sand beach, which has





good views of a sea stack and of Dyrholaey, an island connected to the mainland formed by longshore drift

with a good example of an arch. Both of these were created by hydraulic erosion. Our penultimate stop of the day was at Sólheimajökull glacier tongue. There are black lumps of ash on the glacier from the volcanic eruption in 2010, and these help to

insulate the ice so it doesn't melt. Before our day ended, we travelled to Seljalandsfoss waterfall, which you can actually walk behind and get soaked from the spray. We all returned to the bus, feeling pretty soggy, but in awe of what we had seen that day.

Everyone was sad to start our last day, but we definitely made the most of it. Our first stop was Stora Elborg spatter cone, which we climbed up a very steep slope to. After this, we stopped at a viewpoint over Lake Kleifarvatn for about 10 minutes. This lake is unusual as the water in the lake only comes from rain or what rolls off the nearby hills, as there are no streams to carry water in or out of the lake. Following

this, we visited our last geography-based stop. This was Seltún geothermal area, where there are bubbling

mud pots. The area was formed when scientists dug for geothermal energy, but misjudged the strength of the area they were digging in, causing an explosion which left this area of boiling mud in its place. The heat of the mud will eventually erode all the rock surrounding it. The afternoon was spent

exploring Reykjavik, and we all got to go inside the beautiful cathedral, home to one of the biggest organs in the world with 5275 pipes. The cathedral took





twenty-one years to build and was only finished in the early 1980s.

Our last night concluded with a quiz led by Mrs Menzies, Mrs Bainbridge and Rob, picking our brains about what we had learned this week.

We arrived back at school on June 7th, tired but still thinking about all the new things we had

discovered while in Iceland. Thanks to Mr Miller for organising a fantastic trip, and to Mrs Bainbridge, Mr McEwan and Mrs Menzies who came along to help the trip run smoothly.

Mr Blair said: "All staff at Wallace Hall hope that everyone enjoyed their last day and wish them all the best for the future."
































University Experience

It sounds like everyone in the Nursery had lots of fun!














Queensberry Initiative S3 Biology Day

On Tuesday the 9th of May, the sun was shining and the S3 Biology pupils from Wallace Hall Academy went to Queensberry Estate for a whole day of Biology Sampling Techniques. We were placed into groups and set off with our National 5 workbooks to start the activities which were set up all over the estate by Queensberry Initiative (QI) staff.

First of all we used quadrats to count the species of plants in the fields. We had studied this in





class but it was great to get the chance to do it for real. Another activity found us testing the pH, moisture and light intensity of the soil. QI staff had set pitfall traps in the woods so we removed the bugs from the traps using pooters and used ID charts to identify them.

I think the favourite activity for most of us though was the pond dipping. After hiking up to Beech Loch, we spent forty-five minutes looking for water creatures using nets and then identified them using ID charts. We founds lots of different species in the loch which told us how good the water quality was. We all had a really good day

and hopefully we will now remember all these techniques when we do our exams next year.
