Wallace Hall ELC, Primary and Academy How Good is our School? ... our summary for parents 2024

Education Scotland has asked all schools to report to parents on performance. This will look at what has been going well, what we want to improve on and how we judge our own standards. It will also include information about the key messages you have given us — particularly through feedback from you and from our pupils and how we plan to respond.

Our school is committed to

- A process of self-evaluation to assess our strengths and our areas to improve on.
- Working in partnership with parents not just sharing information with you but genuinely involving you in the work of the school helping us to make this a great place to learn and grow.

Our approach to self-evaluation: What do we do to assess our strengths and plan our development priorities?

- We ask people (pupils/staff/parents) through surveys, focus groups and questionnaires.
- √ We look at the wealth of data we have about the work we do e.g. attendance statistics, House Points and behaviour demerits, assessment information, SQA exam results, Standardised Assessment results, destination figures for our leavers etc.
- √ We observe the learning and teaching that goes on in our school.

The results of our self-evaluation activities are then collated and used to plan improvements. Of course we also have to work towards priorities set by the Scottish Government and by Dumfries and Galloway Council. You will no doubt have heard about the national drive to raise attainment for all and to close the attainment gap between the most deprived areas and the most affluent. This is part of the National Improvement Framework for Scottish education.

The National Improvement Framework priorities are:

- to place the human rights and needs of every child and young person at the centre of education
- to improve attainment for all, particularly in literacy and numeracy
- to improve the learning progress of every child, by closing the attainment gap between the most and the least disadvantaged children and young people
- to improve children and young people's health and wellbeing
- to improve employability skills and sustained positive school leaver destinations for all young people.











Percentage of pupils achieving CfE Levels in Numeracy by the end of P1, P4 and P7 in 2023/24








The graph below shows that pupils gaining National 5 qualifications at the end of S4 at Wallace Hall Academy achieve more success than the regional and national average. National 5 is the most challenging Level of assessment traditionally encountered by S4 pupils. Pupils sit up to seven qualifications at the end of S4, depending on the needs of the individual pupil.




The graph below shows that pupils gaining Higher qualifications at the end of S5 at Wallace Hall Academy achieve more success than the regional and national average. Higher is the most challenging Level of assessment traditionally encountered by S5 pupils. Pupils sit up to five qualifications at the end of S5, depending on the needs of the individual pupil.








The graph below shows that pupils gaining Higher or Advanced Higher qualifications at the end of S6 at Wallace Hall Academy achieve more success than the regional and national average. Advanced Higher is the most challenging Level of assessment traditionally encountered by S6 pupils. Pupils sit up to five qualifications at the end of S6, depending on the needs of the individual pupil.



The graph below shows the percentage of pupils leaving Wallace Hall Academy at the end of S4, S5 or S6 for a positive destination. Examples of positive destinations include attending university or college, gaining employment, volunteering on a gap year or starting an apprenticeship. A significant portion of pupils leave Wallace Hall for a positive destination and we continue to reach out to those who don't to support them in their journey after school.

Wallace Hall works closely with community organisations to help young people access information and opportunities. Wallace Hall Academy Wider Achievement



We take every opportunity to celebrate the achievements of pupils outside of the class-room. Our wider achievement awards assemblies happen once per term, with pupils being awarded a WHA Values Award based on one of the school's 8 Capacities:

Collaboration, Compassion, Composure, Courage, Creativity, Critical Thinking, Criticism, Curiosity



Award winners are selected from information gathered during a data capture in health and wellbeing lessons. These take place once per month. We encourage all pupils to tell us about anything they are taking part in outside of the classroom. We have issued awards for a wide array of activities, ranging from national sporting and performance successes to trying out a new skill for the first time. Values awards also allow pupils to link their own achievement to skill development and we emphasise the importance of this for future life. Our awards assemblies also celebrate the top 3 house point winners in each year group per term.
