The Queensberry Initiative project, a partprogramme nership between the schools of Mid-Nithsdale, the Queensberry Estate, local businesses and Third Sector groups, attended the Dumfries and Galloway Rural LEADER award ceremony on Friday 12 November - and came away with the Smarter Scotland award, а beautiful artisanproduced glass bowl to commemorate the achievements of this innovative partnership project.

The Initiative's key aims - working with the community and local businesses to support and challenge all the pupils in Mid-Nithsdale, to ensure that all students are ready for work, to provide vocational opportunities, to make students more aware of rural opportunities and their environment and to give all students full access to the vast 'outdoor classroom' of the Queensberry Estate were singled out for this award by the judges. The Initiative, which has been running at full strength for just over a year, has already impacted on the lives of young people and has plans to continue building on its successes to date.

Mr Graham stated as he and two senior pupils accepted the award on behalf of the Initiative: "This project is all about engaging our pupils with their community and the countryside where they live. We are really pleased to have the hard work of the staff, adult volunteers and pupils honoured in this way."

The pupils who accepted the award had been representing the Initiative recently at the Scottish Learning Festival, along with 8 other pupils from all year groups in the Academy, talking about the project to teachers and other educationalists. The pupils selected – Niamh Snailham, Hannah Jones, Olivia Mess, Ewan Davidson, Fraser Morton and Teigan Lord – were chosen from the three winning teams which competed in Wallace Hall during their P7 Induction Days. Their teachers had recommended them for their creativity, initiative and artistic flair. Ms Sharon McLean, Learning Leader, met with them for intensive preparation sessions before the big day. Their task was "to come up with a new and different business idea that takes inspiration from something local. Your business could be a product or a service – as long as it's a 'cool' creation and makes money."

This team of young entrepreneurs decided that they wanted their product to be 'green' and eco-friendly, something that people would actually be able to use and that would benefit the community. And so the Squisher was born: a family-friendly device linked to



local shops that compacts plastic milk cartons and makes them easy to recycle. Other aspects of the product that were important to the team and the judges were that it was easy for all to operate with a child lock to prevent accidents, offered rewards for loyal customers, was inexpensive to make and buy and was eco-friendly.

On the day of the competition the team worked under pressure of time to finalise their plans and then had to undergo a 'Dragon's Den' style experience, presenting their product to the other teams and panel of judges. They were delighted to come top in this competition and agreed that it had been a genuine learning experience for all of them, including Ms McLean!

Peer Mediation

We have set up a peer mediation group at Wallace Hall Academy to give responsibility to pupils across the school by helping to resolve minor incidents between pupils before they get out of hand. Mediation is a way to resolve conflict where the people who disagree have a chance to sit face-toface and talk uninterrupted, so that each point of view is heard. The aim is to come to a win/win situation, where both sides are agreeable to the solution. The mediator is someone

'in the middle' helping other people who are having an argument to sort out the problem for themselves.

There are 5 steps involved in peer mediation:

- 1) Agree to mediate;
- 2) Find out what has happened;
- 3) List the problems;
- 4) Get an agreement;
- 5) Settle the agreement.

At Wallace Hall 1st years and 6th years are involved in peer mediation, meeting regularly to get peer mediation set up and discuss any ideas or problems. We have decided that peer mediation will take place in the medical room during lunchtimes although on Thursdays it will take place in the parenting room. To organise a peer mediation session, there is a peer mediation box in the library where you can write your name and tutor group on a slip of paper and we will contact you to set up a meeting. We also have a phone number you can text with your details to organise a meeting and we'd like to thank Tesco for kindly donating the phone.

Peer mediators will be recognisable by a peer mediation badge and if you need a peer mediation session you can also go directly to a peer mediator.


