
Higher Drama Performance

Erasmus Trip to Budapest

On Sunday the 9th of October, the Erasmus group left Wallace Hall Academy at 11 am and headed to Edinburgh airport, where we had time to meet the Scottish football team before flying to Cologne, Germany. After a four hour wait, we finally arrived in Budapest, Hungary at around 9 pm, where we were excited to meet our hosts for the week.

On Monday morning we made our separate ways to Xántus János, the school our hosts attend, travelling by trains, trams, buses and the metro. When we arrived we were given a tour around the school and then began our project work. After a few hours at the school we got a tour bus around the city and

saw some of Budapest's most famous sites, including Heroes' Square and Buda Castle, before having some time to ourselves.

The next day we continued our project work, and then we visited the Hospital in the Rock, a nuclear bunker which was used as a hospital during the Second World War. That night we saw the city with our hosts and did some shopping. On Wednesday we had the opportunity to learn some Hungarian dances in the school before we went to the Budapest Parliament, which was built according to a similar design to Westminster. The security was very high, but the inside was very beautiful. Again, we spent the evening shopping and seeing more of the city.



For our final full day in Hungary, we presented our projects to the other groups and to two other classes in the school, which was a great chance to talk with some of the pupils. We were joined by some of the Belgians in seeing more of the city before spending the last night with our hosts. Sadly, we then had to depart Budapest on a 6.30am flight to Brussels. After some time in the airport, we flew to Edinburgh and arrived back at the school in the early afternoon.

The trip was a fantastic experience which surpassed many of our expectations, and we will never forget the friendships and memories we have made. Thanks to Mr Harley and the Erasmus group for giving us this opportunity.

Printmaking Elective



A group of S3 and S4 pupils have been learning about Printmaking with artist Sarah Keast. Printmaking is a way of making images by using printing blocks and stencil.

The pupils have had a chance to try out several different printmaking techniques starting with mono-printing with acrylic sheets. This involves rolling ink onto acrylic sheets then using brushes and tools to draw into the ink.

The class then moved on to lino cutting pictures and cards. Pupils learned about reduction printing in several stages, making prints then cutting away more of the block before printing the next colour over the top. In term two they tried screen printing. This involves printing using screens covered with a mesh and a stencil. The pupils produced designs and made stencils using a photo emulsion and light box and screen printed



their own bags and pencil cases. This term we are making larger scale prints and trying book binding techniques.





Recently, Higher and Advanced Higher Biology students went on a trip to Edinburgh Zoo.

To fit in with their course, the Advanced Higher pupils decided to make ethograms based on chimpanzees. This involved studying the chimpanzees behaviour for a certain amount of time to see how long they spent on different activities.

The Higher students listened to an interesting lecture relating to Unit 3 of their course which helped them develop their knowledge and understanding. After that, the students were able to see the panda enclosure where the two pandas were eating and sleeping. This was a rare opportunity as one of them was actually awake!

Once all the work was completed we were able to have an hour of free time which allowed us to explore the zoo and see the variety of animals kept there.




